Lee Corbett and Ross Lieb-Lappen have been regulars at the Burlington club for five years during their time as college students at Middlebury and graduate students at UVM.

Whenever Lee and Ross sit down at the bridge table, they always get asked the same question: how do two young people get involved in playing bridge? The age demographic of bridge has changed; several decades ago, playing bridge was the social norm for young people, especially in college. Now, however, most college students favor video games over card games, and very few young adults even know what bridge is. Even as children, Lee and Ross always chose cards over electronic forms of entertainment. They were both raised in card-playing families, and grew up playing hearts at family gatherings. It was only a matter of time before they discovered bridge and became hooked for life.

The first opportunity came in 2005 during their sophomore year at Middlebury College, when Lee and Ross signed up for a bridge class. Most of their peers, who had never heard of the game, assumed that Lee and Ross had enrolled in a class learning about the architecture of bridges. Ross's grandparents and dad played, but he didn't know anything more than counting points. Although the class only met four times, Lee and Ross were

simultaneously intrigued, challenged, and excited. Ross spent the following summer living with his aunt in Durango, CO, who first introduced him to duplicate bridge. Upon returning to Middlebury that fall, he had a mission: to teach Lee everything he had learned over the summer, and to make a maiden voyage to the Burlington club.

After dealing countless practice hands, the two felt ready by January 2006. Ross, for some unknown reason, decided a Thursday night was best (little did he know that it was the most competitive night at the club!). They showed up, wide-eyed and clueless, to a room full of some of the best players in the state. The game didn't go very well. Lee bid 3NT with no clubs, only to have Bryant take half a dozen club tricks right off the top. During a short pause after several rounds, Lee put on her coat and headed towards the door, exhausted and ready to go home... only to be told they were just taking a quick break, and the game was not even half-way done. They managed to finish the game with a meager 23%.

Despite the challenging first night at the club, Ross and Lee kept coming (but, more appropriately, on Monday nights). They came almost every week, making the hour-long drive from Middlebury for the next several years. During this time, they grew to love the game, and especially grew to love the friendly atmosphere and great companionship that are characteristic of the Monday night game.

Lee (Geology) and Ross (Environmental Chemistry) graduated from Middlebury College in 2007. After graduation, with only 2-3 masterpoints each, they embarked on a hiking, camping, bridge-playing road trip across the country, playing at clubs in Pittsburgh, PA; Sioux City, IA; Duluth, MN; Fargo, ND; and Wichita, KS. They conveniently arrived in Wichita just in time for a newcomer tournament, where they triumphantly won the entire game despite being the lowest-ranked pair (see photo). The following day they were actively recruited for their first attempt at Swiss teams. After winning this event as well, they doubled their masterpoint total, achieving the coveted rank of Junior Master.

Lee and Ross returned to Vermont to begin M.S. degrees at UVM in Geology and Mathematics, respectively. For the next three years, they continued to attend the Monday night games every week and traveled (often with Ross's grandparents) to many tournaments around New England, gradually developing their own style. They realized that they enjoyed learning new conventions, and eventually adopted numerous bidding gadgets which frequently solicited comical nicknames from the Monday night crowd. Some of their favorite conventions include Mini-Roman, Snapdragon, SCUM, and Puppet Stayman. There were many high points during their time playing bridge in Burlington, including having their first 75% game this past winter. There have also been periodic humorous bidding blow-ups, usually immediately following the introduction of a new convention. At the President's Cup two years ago, they had just adopted superaccepting transfers over 1NT. Lee had the perfect hand to use the new toy, and excitedly super-accepted Ross's transfer to hearts; alas, Ross forgot to re-transfer to hearts, and the pair rapidly arrived at the 6-level without the intended trump suit ever having been bid. Ross had the brilliant idea to spontaneously invent a 6-level transfer by bidding 6D; unfortunately, Lee had no idea what he was doing and passed. Lee had the pleasure to play 6D in her 3-1 fit.

As a product of their growing love of the game, Lee and Ross have expanded beyond the weekly club games and occasional tournaments. They have become dedicated to teaching bridge to other young adults. Since 2007, they have taught over 100 students at Middlebury in an annual winter course, and have even managed to convince some of their students to come to the Monday night game.

After five years of playing in Burlington, it has sadly come time for Lee and Ross to move on (but don't worry, they're not going very far away!). They will both be starting graduate school again, this time for PhD's at Dartmouth. Ross will be in the Engineering department, studying the mechanics of sea ice in northern Alaska and Antarctica. Lee will continue her work on climate change in Greenland through the Earth Sciences department. They plan to play bridge in the Hanover club weekly, and hope to see many of the Burlington players at tournaments in the future.

During their time in Vermont, bridge has been an incredibly important part of Lee and Ross's lives. They want to very sincerely thank the Burlington bridge players for the years of friendship, support, and encouragement. 
ACBL President Visits Manchester, VT

DIRECTOR (please)

The world of tournament bridge is evolving. There are now new games available at regional tournaments. The two newest are the bracketed Swiss teams and "Gold Rush" pair games for players with fewer than 750 master points.

In *ANY* bracketed event, it is important to report accurately your team master points. The slip that you fill out when you buy your entry asks for three items (total team master points, number of players on the team and a name that the directors may call if there is a problem before the game starts). Report the master point total of all players. If you have a five or six person team, the computer will automatically place you in the correct bracket if you state that you have a five or six person team. If you report too few master points and are incorrectly bracketed in a lower bracket, you will be disqualified and not eligible for any master point awards. If you report too many master points, you may be placed in a higher bracket and winning will be more difficult. Your total team master points are not checked until after all names are entered into the computer (which is midway in the first round and too late to correct the bracketing). The ACBL updates master point totals monthly on around the 7th of the month. You may be able to check master point levels before the game, but if you are planning to play in a bracketed event, check your level online in the most recent ACBL bulletin before you go to the regional.

The bracketed Swiss teams is a cross between knockouts and Swiss teams. The field is bracketed at the time of entry by team total master points. Most of the brackets will have eight teams and you will play *ALL* the other teams in your bracket. You cannot withdraw early from this event as you can from a straight Swiss teams. This event ends earlier than a regular Swiss teams, because you don't have to wait for the last team to finish to get your pairing for the next round.

Depending on region of the country, the top and/or bottom bracket may not have eight teams. This depends on the number of teams entered. You do not have to play a team that is out of your bracket, so a C team will never face an A team. The bracket(s) with more than eight teams are matched like a regular Swiss based on victory points at the end of each round. The number of master points awarded depends on the number of brackets and the strength of your bracket. In some parts of the country you may ask to "play up", but this is not permitted in all regions. Some regions have the first bracket with only eight teams and only the last bracket with more than eight teams. These rules are defined in the conditions of contest.

The "Gold Rush" started as a pair game for players with fewer than 750 master points. In reality, this is a stratiflighted event with an A flight for players with more than 750 master points. The "Gold Rush" pair game is then stratified as 0-300 and 300-750. <u>All</u> players are eligible for gold points. Players with section tops or overall placing in the higher stratification get gold points. These games have been a huge success in New England with a first place award of nearly 20 gold points. Players with more than 750 master points should play in the A/X pairs as that game gets credit for all the tables in the "Gold Rush" pairs and that game also has large master point awards.

New England regionals now hold "Gold Rush" Swiss teams and a compact knockout. In Sturbridge and Warwick the events are scheduled for Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday. There will also be a bracketed Swiss on Thursday. Gold points have never been easier to obtain. In Saratoga, the "Gold Rush" pair games were on Friday and Saturday. In the Liverpool (Syracuse) August regional the "Gold Rush" games are scheduled daily Tuesday through Saturday.

I would like to change the subject for the last part of this article and to say a bit about tempo. It is important to act in tempo in both bidding and play. A fast pass can convey as much unauthorized information as a slow pass. As much as possible, plan your defense of the hand at trick one while the declarer is thinking about his/her play of the hand. Decide at trick one whether you are going to cover an honor or duck, so when the play is presented you play in tempo. That makes declarer play much more difficult. Hesitation at the time the honor is played may give away the position. Play each card at the same speed (this does not mean slowly). Slow play is also to be avoided.

It is also impolite to detach a card from your hand before declarer or dummy plays a card. This behavior may be considered intimidating and subject to penalty.

All The Marbles

Here are 2 hands where it's possible to take home all the marbles.

1. The first comes from the recent senior regional at Hyannis. Get it right and you come in first overall in the Sunday top bracket Swiss. You open 1C with

S AKQ H AKJ9 D 743 C Q43

Partner responds 1H which you raise to 4H. Partner cue bids 5D. What now? See below for the solution to this problem.

2. Hand 2 comes from the May 20 club game in Montpelier. What weird distribution!! It must be one of those darned computer hands. Oh wait a minute! The humans dealt this hand at the start of the game.

I was East and opened the bidding 1D. South preempted with 3D. This ended the bidding. South made 3D and we scored -110. What a strange hand! We entered the auction only at the 1 level and sold out to 3D when we can take <u>all 13 tricks</u> (all the marbles) in either black suit.

It turns out that -110 was an average result (2.5 out of 5). One North/South pair scored +300 and another scored +400. I know that at one table East opened 1D and everybody passed.

Solution to hand 1: The winning action is to bid 5S (or 6H). Partner's hand is

S J10xx H Q10xxxx D AKx C Void

At the table opener was afraid of clubs elected to sign off in 5H. The result was 5H making 7. Guess who didn't win the bracket 1 Swiss teams.

What should opener do? He knows partner doesn't have the ace of clubs, since he would have bid the lower ranking ace first. Should opener reason that partner must have something in clubs to suggest the possibility of a slam? Should he reason that, because of the opening 1C bid, partner is counting on opener for clubs?

Should responder have cue bid clubs instead of diamonds. That wouldn't have helped, since opener's 3 small diamonds would certainly have forced a retreat to 5H. Maybe responder should just have taken a chance and blasted to 6H. That works on the actual hand but not if opener's clubs and spades were reversed (Qxx of spades and AKQ of clubs).

Of all the people I consulted, only one said he would have cue bid 5S. That was Rich DeMartino. It's funny how people with over 22,000 master points frequently make the right decision.

Queen Asks

Many slam contracts depend on the location of the queen of trump. Because of the importance of the trump queen, bidding methods exist to ask partner whether he has the queen or extra trump length. You may wish to bid a small or grand slam if your side has the trump queen or extra length and otherwise to stay out. Responder typically counts extra length to be the equivalent of the queen, because the queen is much more likely to drop in a ten card trump fit than in a nine card fit.

I have two interesting hands from recent tournaments that illustrate the queen ask for both a small and a grand slam. The small slam hand has an additional twist. – It was played in a flight A KO and BOTH declarers misplayed at trick 2 and BOTH defenders misplayed at trick 3!

The 4NT bid was Roman key card Blackwood. And asked partner how many of the 5 key cards he held. The 4 aces counted as key cards and also the king of trump. South's 5C bid showed 1 or

4 key cards. North's 5D bid asked South whether he held the queen of trump. South thought his extra length was good enough and bid 6S to show the queen (or extra length) and no outside king.

Both West players led the diamond queen. Both declarers needed to cross to their hand to lead trump. Because of the auction, the safest way would have been to cash the second diamond pitching declarer's singleton heart. Then declarer could trump a heart at trick 3. The subsequent trump lead would draw out the singleton ace -6 Spades bid and made. Both declarers played dummy's ace of hearts at trick 2 followed by another heart trumped in hand. Both defenders failed to find the winning overruff with the singleton ace. Despite their errors, both declarers made their 6S contract. This goes to show that one can never fully master the game and that even top players make mistakes.

While you are admiring your south hand, you unexpectedly see partner open 1C. You will NEVER hold this hand again (only 5 red cards AKQAK). You content yourself with a 1S response. Your 2D call is new minor forcing. Partner's 2S response shows a minimum hand with 3 trumps. 4NT was Roman keycard Blackwood. The 5C response showed 1 or 4 key cards. The six club response showed the club king. Responder's 6D call asked for the trump queen. The 6H Call said yes (6S would have said no). South had no trouble bidding the virtually cold grand slam.

I still remember attending a lecture at a recent national tournament by bridge pro and raconteur Eddie Kantar. Eddie told us about "Too Tall Tex" who had a reputation for peeking. Too Tall added an additional step to his queen ask responses. 5S showed 2 key cards with the queen. The additional step of 5NT stated, "Partner, I don't have the queen, but I know who does."

World Wide Bridge Contest

A world wide bridge competition took place on Friday evening June 3 and Saturday afternoon June 4. Clubs throughout the world participated in the two single session events. Vermonters participated on Friday night at the Apollo Bridge Club in Montpelier and on Saturday afternoon at the Burlington Bridge Academy. The results for those 2 games are given below. The masterpoint awards shown and the percentages are based on the results achieved locally. The world wide ranks are based on world wide matchpoints where each board has a matchpoint top of about 5,000, based on the actual number of times the board was played around the world. As you can see, the world wide ranks don't necessarily follow the local ranks. Some of the differences are surprising. The ranks are based on those posted on the ecatsbridge.com website at the time I prepared this article. As of the time of this article, there were 5,232 pairs with results reported for Friday night and 5,214 pairs with results reported for Saturday afternoon.
